Greetings from Kolonget Village in Eldoret!

It's truly surreal to reflect on how far we've come since my last update, when we were seeking funds to construct and launch the Regina Yego Girls Center. Thanks to the incredible spirit of generosity from supporters like you, we've seen this vision come to life in ways that warm my heart every day. Additionally, I am deeply grateful to Giving Women Switzerland for their technical support. Stefanie, Esther, Marie-Nolle, Atalanti, and Seema—thank you for the many hours you invested to help in designing, preparing, planning, and fundraising for this project. Your dedication has been invaluable. I also want to express my heartfelt thanks to my close friends and family for their encouragement during moments when I was losing hope.

Walking through the center, it's amazing to witness the joy and enthusiasm of the girls who now call this place their safe haven. They express themselves, create, innovate, and learn in an environment that we all built together, brick by brick. Your support has turned this dream into a reality, and it's deeply gratifying to be part of it.

I'm excited to share that we've just celebrated the completion of Cohort 1—our very first group of exceptional girls! We proudly graduated 23 girls out of the 25 who started. These girls have been equipped with essential skills in ICT, basic

entrepreneurship, crafting, and life skills.

Thanks to our dedicated partners and networks, we've secured scholarships for 3 girls, apprenticeships for 1, and work placements for another. Additionally, 3 girls had already secured spots at various colleges before graduation. We are now focused on ensuring the remaining 15 girls transition successfully into their next steps.

As we prepare for Cohort 2, we were thrilled that 49 applicants qualified, more than we had planned to recruit. After careful consideration, we've decided to admit 37 deserving girls, exceeding our original target of 30. We're currently facing some logistical challenges, including the need for more chairs and additional laptops. However, I'm confident that we will meet these needs and continue making a significant impact.

Last December, I was selected as one of 19 leaders from East Africa by the Issroff Family Foundation's Continued Learning Initiative (CLI). This opportunity has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my leadership journey. The main deliverable of the initiative is a strategic plan, and I'm thrilled to share that we now have a strategic plan for 2025-2027 that is 98% complete. I'm very excited about this next chapter for Good Kenyan.



This achievement has been a collaborative effort with key stakeholders. I extend special gratitude to our volunteer advisors, consultants, board members, staff, and alumni who contributed countless hours to this project. I would also like to recognize the IFF team for their leadership, support, and the work of their reviewers and facilitators. We will officially launch this strategic plan in January 2025 and begin its implementation. We look forward to sharing more details during our 8th anniversary celebration in April 30th 2025.

Please join me in welcoming Gemma May and Liz Matimu to our board as they join the current members transitioning out. With three more members coming in January 2025, we're excited to continue strengthening our governance and leadership

Thank you from the bottom of my heart to everyone for your ongoing support. I invite you to read through our latest updates and look forward to your continued support as we work to propel underserved Kenyan youth toward sustainable futures.

The journey to establishing the Regina Yego Girls Center has been nothing short of extraordinary. It's a story of vision, perseverance, and the unwavering support of our incredible community. What began as a distant dream in 2017 slowly took shape in Nairobi, evolving from a part-time endeavor into a well-structured initiative, thanks to the support of friends and partners.

In 2021, with invaluable backing from the Segal Foundation's Booster Program and the expertise of Warrande Advisory, we crafted a comprehensive three-year plan. Although our initial vision included Eldoret, we faced funding challenges. During last year's Giving Tuesday, we launched a campaign to construct two training rooms, an office, and three toilets, complete with electricity and water. Despite reaching only 10% of our fundraising goal, we pressed on and broke ground on December 27th, driven by faith and a strong foundation. At that point, we only had enough funds for the foundation itself.

As construction progressed, we were uplifted by the incredible generosity of friends, supporters, and even strangers. Donations of cement, windows, doors, plastering materials, and electrical work poured in. Each call, each contribution was like a magical moment, bringing us closer to completing the center. Before we knew it, the Regina Yego Girls Center was up and running, a testament to the power of collective effort.

Your support has been instrumental in this journey, and we are profoundly grateful for the commitment and encouragement that have carried us to this point.

Experience Working with the Girls:

Working with the girls has been amazing. Seeing the progress we have made as a new team has been both fun and a valuable learning experience. It constantly challenges me to grow and adjust in terms of location, training knowhow, and my people skills.

Witnessing Significant Growth or Transformation

I have witnessed significant mindset shifts and growth in the girls. Some have changed their career paths to fields they had never considered before, thanks to the skills imparted to them. Others have gained more confidence in speaking in front of people. Many now dream beyond their previous limitations, with increased exposure and a broader understanding of the world.

Specific Skills Impacted

The Creative Hub lessons impart skills in innovation, design, and recycling. The girls have learned to use two different electrical machines, various materials, and tools for box-making. They can upcycle existing materials to make their own clothes and thrift flip for sale.

They also have the ability to create crafts to beautify their spaces and generate income from making and selling gift boxes, tote bags, and mats (including tapestry and fabric mats) from recycled materials. Additionally, my class provided some knowledge on brand identity by applying the principles and elements of design.

Experience Working with the Girls

Working with the girls at the Good Kenyan Regina Yego Girls Center has been a profoundly rewarding experience. The dedication and enthusiasm they brought to the entrepreneurship classes were truly inspiring. Their eagerness to learn and grow as future entrepreneurs made each session dynamic and engaging.

Witnessing Significant Growth or Transformation

One instance that stands out is during the pitching sessions. Initially, many of the girls were hesitant and unsure of their ideas. However, as the training progressed, I witnessed remarkable growth. By the time of their final pitches, they demonstrated confidence, clarity, and a deep understanding of their business concepts. Seeing them transform from nervous beginners to confident presenters was truly gratifying.

Specific Skills Impacted

The class focused on imparting several crucial skills. The girls learned the fundamentals of business planning, financial literacy, and market research. We also emphasized soft skills such as effective communication, teamwork, and problem-solving. These skills not only prepared them for entrepreneurial ventures but also equipped them with tools to navigate various aspects of life with confidence and competence.
